### changes to the Highway Code

from 29 January 2022

Rule H1 Introduction of 'Hierarchy of Road Users'

- · Those in charge of vehicles which can cause the greatest harm bear the most responsibility to take care & reduce risks to others.
- · Applies most strongly to lories, buses, vans, cars, taxis & motorcycles.



- In the same way, cyclists, horse riders and drivers of horse drawn carriages have a responsibility to reduce danger to pedestrians.
- · But ALL road users retain responsibility to take care of their own and others' safety.




